The whole world is festering with unhappy souls;
The French hate the Germans, the Germans hate the Poles.
Italians hate Yugoslavs, South Africans hate the Dutch.
And I don't like anybody very much!

This little ditty is from a song called *The Merry Minuet*, recorded by The Kingston Trio over fifty years ago. (Let me repeat that for those of you who've been around long enough to own an original copy of the album in which the song is included [as I do]: "Fifty years ago!")

These lyrics, of course, no longer reflect the specifics of current world affairs, but the basics remain pretty much the same – similar script, new characters; history imitating history. It seems as if we humans are caught up in a constant, swirling storm of events that keep all of us on edge, waiting to see what comes next. Yet in the midst of it all we continue to seek peace – not just peace among nations, but peace within ourselves.

Each of us is on a journey in this life, looking for answers to life's most vexing questions: Why is life the way it is? What can I do to make things better? How can I find peace with myself? A gathered fellowship such as ours can't pretend to provide easy answers to such questions, but it's probably the place where most of us begin. Just as a compass can support us on a hike through unknown terrain, congregational life offers the support we seek on our individual spiritual journeys. And even though the answers we seek are ultimately found within ourselves, it's often in the community of the faith and hope that they're brought to light – especially in the kind of open, liberal religious setting our Kearsarge Unitarian Universalist fellowship provides.

In the respective worlds of churches, schools, and yes, even *politics*, autumn is a season of beginnings, of new hope. Here in New England, the crisp morning air and the brilliant colors of the turning leaves are reminders of the high expectations the season brings. In the words of Henry David Thoreau, written in his *Journal*, 1853:

Live in each season as it passes; breathe the air, drink the drink, taste the fruit, and resign yourself to the influences of each. . . . Some men [and women] think they are not well in spring or summer, or autumn, or winter; it is only because they are not well *in* them.

In this autumn of 2014, may each of us find him- or herself well *in* the season, that we may be the people of hope and promise that we'll called to be.

This little light of mine, I'm going to make it shine...


Have you ever stopped to consider how many types of groups we have in our fairly small church with its 47 members? That is, groups of people doing special activities for and because of their involvement with KUUF—

The Language of Life: DNA and the Revolution in Personalized

Medicine By Francis S. Collins, 2010.

A scientific and medical revolution has crept up on us, based on study after study, from hundreds of laboratories around the world. Every one of us will be touched by it and many of us already have been. Crucial decisions about what we all need to know and what choices we make about our health are at stake.

Francis Collins was the head of the international Human Genome Project for fifteen years and now serves as the Director of the National Institutes of Health (NIH). Just in the past decade, most of what you think you know about DNA has been overturned. Much of the advice given by health care providers is ill informed, so you need to educate yourself about this rapidly changing area of medicine.

Church World Service accepts no administrative fee from our Crop Walk donations, which means that 100% of the money raised goes directly toward the cause. In addition, 25% of the money our KUUF team raises will stay right here in our local food banks and the remainder will be used to help feed hungry people around the world. Some of the international programs that will benefit from your donation include:

- supporting farming cooperatives in Haiti that help 4,500 families grow their own food
- providing dependable supplies of safe water to villages in Burma
- feeding children in sub-Saharan Africa, who are displaced & orphaned by HIV & AIDS
