God is in the connections - the continuity of all things.



The Seven Daughters of Eve: The Science that Reveals Our Genetic Ancestry by Bryan Sykes, 2001

Where do I come from? How often have you asked yourself that question?

We may know our parents and grandparents; but beyond that, for most of us, the trail begins to disappear into the mist. But each of us carries a message from our ancestors in every cell of our body. It is our DNA, the genetic material that is handed down for generations. Within the DNA is written, not only our histories as individuals, but the whole history of the human race.

Sykes reveals how the identification of a particular strand of DNA that passes unbroken through the maternal line allows us to trace our genetic makeup all the way back to prehistoric times – to seven primeval women, "The Seven Daughters of Eve".

Mike was born in Budapest during a turbulent time of political unrest building up to WWII. He and his family left Hungary in 1946 to live in Sweden for two years and then immigrated to the US in 1948. He did not talk about his early life except to say that it was difficult with his father sent to work camps for the Jews under Hitler's regime.

His mother worked with Raul Wallenberg, the Swedish diplomat who worked to save hundreds of Hungarian Jews, and they lived in one of Wallenberg's "protected" houses in Budapest and ultimately went to Sweden after the war.

Mike attended Colombia Grammar School in Manhattan while they applied to be US citizens. He attended Pratt University and graduated as a Chemical Engineer. He and his family lived in northern Virginia in the 1950's, and Mike worked in the US Patent Office and attended George Washington University Law School. He met Liz at this time, and they married in 1965. He worked as a Patent Attorney specializing in an International Practice which afforded him his favorite pastime (next to opera) of traveling all over the world.

Mike claimed that his years spent in New London were his golden years of pure enjoyment. He was an active member of the Tom and Tom men's group, the "Old Guy's" breakfast club, Kearsun men's group, and occasionally he even went to exercise at the gym. His motto about exercise came from Mark Twain: "Whenever I get the urge to exercise, I lie down until the feeling passes away."

He is survived by his wife, Liz, his three children – Michael, Gretchen, and Katie – and his three grandchildren – Jakob, Sofia, and Jersey.
