Homily Title: "The Practice of Nature"

Henry David Thoreau once wrote, "Let us spend one day as deliberately as Nature." Thoreau and the transcendentalists found in nature a philosophic model for leading a spiritual life. Through observation and intimate involvement with the natural world insight and development of human capacity emerge. The simple act of looking at the cold winter sky contains a profound depth. Perhaps nature itself can provide a model that leads us toward calm stability, a long view and a more natural way to experience our human embodiment.

Thoughts from the KUUF Congregation WHY ARE WE HERE?

I would now like to consider the reason that we exist, as miraculous as it is that we do. I believe there is a fairly simple answer to this age-old question. The answer may not be very satisfying to many but I think it is pretty close to being correct.

Everything exists because of imperfection.

In the beginning, when everything was compressed into a tiny dot, there must have been an ever so slight imperfection in this singularity, which eventually caused enough of an imbalance that the Big Bang occurred. From that point on slight variations over enormous stretches of time caused the simplest of things to coalesce or repel creating more variations and densities that created new and more complex things. These things in turn evolved due to slight imperfections; new more complex atoms; atoms that coalesced into molecules; molecules that weren't all perfect and thus allowed for change; eventually this lead to self-sustaining molecules and life. Imperfections in the replication of life forms resulted in new life forms and those that did well reproduced and survived more successfully and so it goes to this day.

So if the universe were perfect there would be no change; perfect is perfect. With no change there is no space in which change takes place and no time during which change occurs, no evolution just static perfection. So for us to exist there must be imperfection. We are imperfect for a very good reason – so that we can exist.

DO YOU KNOW THIS ACRONYM????

LGBTQQIP2SAA - Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender,

Two Q's to cover both bases (queer and questioning);

I for Intersex, people with two sets of genitalia or various chromosomal differences;

P for Pansexual, people who refuse to be pinned down on the Kinsey scale;

2S for Two-Spirit, a tradition in many First Nations that considers sexual minorities to have both male and female spirits;

A for Asexual, people who do not identify with any orientation; and **A** for Allies, recognizing that the community thrives best with loving supporters, although they are not really part of the community itself.

That manages to be pretty inclusive, but it's also pretty unwieldy.
