

The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood, 1984

Set in the near future, it describes life in what was once the United States and is now the Republic of Gilead, a monotheocracy that has reacted to social unrest and sharply declining birthrate by reverting to, and going beyond, the repressive far right Schlafly/Falwell type of ideals of intolerance of the original Puritans. It takes the book of Genesis literally, with bizarre consequences for the women.

The story is told by Offred, one of the handmaids. It is funny, horrifying, and convincing. It is satire with a dire warning.

This book is available in hardcover, paperback, and audio. Please join us for the discussion even if you haven't read the book.


Set on the fictional San Piedro Island in the northern <u>Puget</u> <u>Sound</u> region of the <u>Washington state</u> coast in 1950, the plot revolves around the murder case of Kazuo Miyamoto (<u>Rick Yune</u>), a <u>Japanese American</u> accused of killing Carl Heine, a <u>White</u> fisherman. The trial occurs in the midst of deep <u>anti-Japanese sentiments</u> following <u>World War II</u>. Covering the case is the editor of the town's one-man newspaper, Ishmael Chambers (<u>Ethan Hawke</u>), a World War II veteran who lost an arm fighting the Japanese in the <u>Pacific War</u>. Ishmael struggles with his childhood, and continuing, love for Kazuo's wife, Hatsue (<u>Youki</u> <u>Kudoh</u>), and his conscience, wondering if Kazuo is truly innocent.

CELEBRATING MOTHER'S DAY

The original Mother's Day Proclamation was written by Julia Ward Howe in 1870. Well-known at the time as a vibrant anti-slavery activist, suffragette and poet, she had composed the militant hymn "Battle Hymn of the Republic", which became the Union Army's most popular song during the Civil War.

The then-new technology of photography, with journalists' graphic depictions of how nearly 100,000 men and boys lost their lives, and the post war traumas of 100,000 returning injured, jolted Julia into an intense anti-war activism, calling mothers to cry out for peace.

Here we are, 147 years later, building again on the deep concerns of women, exhibited in the giant January D.C. Demonstration and the determined, continuing committee work.

The proclamation was shocking to many back in 1870. Julia expressed a deep understanding of the cultural, economic and political pressures which still support wars. Julia's husband and family were extremely upset though many of her descendants now encourage a fresh return to pressing for peace. It is interesting to note that Anna Jarvis, the woman who proposed an honoring - mothers alternative celebration 35 years later, became very uncomfortable with the commercialization of her basically beautiful idea. It was intended then to support the women's suffrage movement and was considered helpful.

We can honor Mother's Day both ways; to celebrate loving respect for our mothers and a deep commitment to work for peace.

Here are some excerpts from Julia Ward Howe's original Mother's Day Call for Peace:

"Arise women of this day"! "Say firmly, we will not have great questions decided by irrelevant agencies. Our sons will not be taken from us to unlearn all that we have taught them of charity, mercy and patience. We women of one country will be too tender of those of another to allow our sons to be trained to injure theirs.

"In the name of womanhood and of humanity, I earnestly ask that a general congress of women without limit of nationality maybe appointed and held at some place deemed most convenient and at the earliest period consistent with its objects, to promote the alliance of the different nationalities, the amicable settlement of international questions, the great and general interests of peace".
