PART II OF TWO ARTICLES ON A CHURCH & TOWN DIVIDED

In writing 'The History of the Town of Andover', published in 1910, John Eastman, declared, "The struggle over the new meeting house was probably the most unfortunate event in the history of the town, for its effects have been far reaching, not only in the religious but in the social and political life of the community... Puring the contest over the location of the new meeting house the citizen began to lose confidence in the character and authority of the church and in the unselfishness of his neighbors... Fear of Satan, and a frantic attempt to destroy his influence by new religious organizations took the place of a trustful love of God and... to a reasonable service to humanity." Mr. Eastman hoped that, as of his publishing in 1910, "...an honest study and application of...the Golden Rule will... eradicate the taint of the meetinghouse war of more than a century ago." How could the town pull itself together and not only get a meeting house built but end such acrimonious community debate that now pitted East Andover against West (central) Andover?

During the 18th and 19th centuries in New England the meeting house was where democracy took place and where God was the ultimate guide. Local taxes were used to pay for the meeting house construction and a town-wide tithe was assessed annually to pay for the local pastor and the land he was to live on. Separating religion from politics has never really been accomplished anywhere, but in the Town of Andover it seemed to be the only way to resolve their deep divisions. Separation began very fitfully when "about 1795 great opposition to the payment of the 'minister tax' arose and so great was the influence of the independent citizens that payment was not rigorously enforced." Debate waned off and on during the next century over these religious taxes, but amazingly the Congregationalists got a church built in East Andover in 1796 (at great social/religious cost of dissent from the "western" Andover public). Eventually the Universalists in 1821 were able to rally enough support to construct a meeting house in the west --with skilled hands, some rum (and an inevitable community tax).

More said of our KUUF meetinghouse heritage in the next "ROOTS".

WINTER 2015 FOOD PANTRY CAMPAIGN

The KLS Community Food Pantry continues to be very, very busy. Not only do we continue to see new families every month, we also have been serving larger families. In 2014 we have seen nearly a 20% increase in use of the food pantry. The support of the area churches and community residents has been phenomenal and has made it possible for the food pantry to be an extremely valuable asset to struggling families in the Kearsarge Lake Sunapee region. Despite many trips to the Food Bank in Manchester (our main supplier), as well as some very successful food drives and donations, we are still often running out of several **staple items** with the steady and increasing flow of families using the pantry.
