PROCTOR ACADEMY AND THE UUA "ARRANGEMENT"

Now that the "Cruft Chapel" now called the "Stone Chapel" was left void of a Unitarian congregation during the early 1960's, the newly formed national Unitarian Universalist Association automatically became its owner/caretaker according to Mrs. Cruft's property deed. But for the UUA it became a small unused building in a small remote New England town. What was the UUA to do?... Thus began negotiations with Proctor Academy.

Underlying these issues there were caveats: *First*, three small monetary trusts existed with the UUA Common Endowment Fund that were providing payments to the Academy. *Second*, "In 1958 the *[Academy's]* 123-year-long formal association with the American Unitarian Association *[A.U.M.]* was amicably dissolved..." and the school had no formal need for a chapel within its midst. *Third*, this same disassociation with the A.U.M. had a stipulation that "...should Proctor ever close, all *[academy]* property would revert to the church." There were still major Unitarian strings attached.

One assumes the above three issues were part of the negotiations when a new property deed was drawn up in 1967 stating the (now) Unitarian-Universalist Association would convey to Proctor Academy the building and surrounding land within 30 feet of the chapel. BUT, "Should...the Unitarian Universalist Association determine that Proctor Academy has failed...for a period of two years to meet...the [following] conditions...[then] title to the said premises shall revert to said Association."

These conditions were:

- 1. "That Proctor Academy maintain the Church building in satisfactory repair... [and insured for fire and casualty];
- That a majority of Proctor Academy chapel services held in the Church be conducted by ministers in Fellowship with Unitarian Universalist Association;
- 3. That said Church be made reasonably available to the Community for weddings, funerals, and special occasions."

One "small" issue remained— Where was a U.U. fellowship to conduct a "majority of Proctor Academy chapel services held in the Church"?

Getting to Know Our KUUF Congregation

Marion Allen and Kathy Vashro had the honor to meet with Susan Crickman at the Newbury Library for this 'Getting To Know our Congregation' series. Susan allowed us to interrupt her busy packing schedule as she and husband, Chuck, will be moving from her lovely mountain view Newbury home to a retirement community near Peterborough in December. Marion and Kathy decided to do an interview with Susan at this time because of her move and we wanted her to have an opportunity to share her story with you and you with her. Thank you so much Susan for your time and your story.

Susan is a first generation American with liberal thinking parents from Finland. In Susan's travels she has been able to meet some of her relatives who continue to live in Finland. Susan was raised in a home across the street from where nuns lived and she learned to address nuns and priests by 'sister' or 'father'... though she went to a radically segregated public school they did read from the Bible and said the Lord's Prayer. Susan with her interest in religion, ethics, philosophy, politics and joy of liberal religious youth group chose not to participate in the ritual of the Lord's Prayer and stuck to her beliefs all her life, without being baptized, dedicated, or christened. After HS, Susan went off to Oberlin College for one year and missing her future husband, decided to move back to DC where she married her teen sweetheart, Chuck, February 18, 1956.

Susan had a full life with 3 children, enjoying cooking, traveling and entertaining them with books and games during their

travels across the country four times, while blending Chuck's work with family vacations.

Though Susan wasn't planning on teaching in a church, her kids wanted her close, so she chose to co-teach at a UU church in Maryland figuring the kids would not be harmed by a liberal religious education. As they aged, one married a Christian, one married a Quaker and one married a Catholic. Even with all the religious differences within the family they continue to get along and spend time together here close to Newbury.

Susan finished her Bachelors and went on to completing her Masters in Library and Information Science giving her an opportunity to work and volunteer at libraries in Maryland and Newbury, NH. She taught children about the wonders of reading and owning a library card, creating children's programs and supervising children's library staff. She also volunteered at the Food Pantry when it opened in New London. Susan retired after 15 years and then made time to take piano, water exercises, volunteering at a UU church office and then decided she wanted to go back to substituting at various public libraries.

Susan enjoys being home focusing on her family, doing jigsaw puzzles, watching movies, reading, participating in book clubs and being active with the local League of Woman Voters. She has facilitated fair voting and other League projects that relate to her life's values and are reinforced by her participation in UU churches.

Susan has many blessings in her life and thoroughly cherishes and enjoys them from her liberal upbringing, wonderful long marriage (celebrating her 60th anniversary soon), 3 children, 6 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild.
